**1. MOMENT OF SILENCE**

**2. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE**

Hindle led the Pledge of Allegiance.

**3. ROLL CALL**

Members Present: Councilors Hindle, Hofemann, Mayor Nossiff, Councilor Quigley, Mayor Pro Tem Taylor, Councilors Tweedie, Whitmore, and Christenbury.

Councilor Dunnington is absent.

**4. PROCLAMATIONS/AWARDS**

The Mayor read the letter from Mrs. Lunney of North Adams Massachusetts. Her Dad's name was Mr. Edward J. Lunney who had presented the mayor with a medal of the old city hall from Old Home Day in the year of 1914. Tom Hindle received this medal for the Woodman Institute. There was no objection from any councilor to giving the medal to the museum. All in favor.

**5. CITIZEN'S FORUM**

**Ron Huml** of Mast Road gave brief comment on his experience in the Navy, upon retirement he became the financial officer for the city owned hospital. He is here tonight for the \$100,000 that was pledged to the school and the city. He does not feel that with all the money given to the school they should have this additional money. He thinks this money should go back to the taxpayers next year, as well as the \$200,000 that was pledged to the school.

**Robert Latture** of 25 Birch Drive urged the council to eliminate term limits tonight. Also on 7/10, this council scheduled a workshop to do with TAC and solid waste. This workshop did not take place because legal counsel had ruled this should not be discussed. He was upset that the workshop was not held. He continued reading the City Charter and how a special meeting is to be called and by whom. He requested a copy of the correspondence that was distributed by the City Manager to the council by email. He feels the council's authority was usurped. He continued what happened was covert and conspiratorial. He demands an explanation.

Quigley now present.

**Scot Myers**, chair of DEDC stated it is an exciting time for the Corporation along the Cocheco River. He listed events that have occurred in that area to date. He asked for the council's support in the events that will be coming forth.

**Roderick Gadway** of 94 Spruce Lane commenting on the previous speaker saying all this costs money. He is originally from that state called "TAXachusetts". He feels we are spending money in ways that do not need to be spent. On another subject, of 99 Spruce Lane. He feels animals should be kept on their own property. Do you people make these laws? Can it be that those chickens must be kept in a pen?

**Bill Caldwell** of 29 Tanglewood Drive. For the last 18 months, they have lived in stench and filth. There are codes and laws. The farmer does anything he wants. They have tried over and over for 18 months to get justice. Their neighborhood is the most unhealthy in the city. People are trying to sell their houses. He commented on the illegally cancelled meeting; the councilors are supposed to make policy, not the city manager.

**Brian Stern**, Attorney of Dover addressed the proposal to limit city hall to certain political groups. Public grounds should be made available to the residents and public facilities should be open to the public.

**Charles Hosken** commented on the dumping and rubbish landlord problem. His concern is about dumpsters and rubbish barrels and how they are out in the open all week not just on rubbish day. Other than that they should be out of site. The city is responsible for following up on this. He asked how often does he have to bring this subject up.

The Mayor addressed Mr. Latture. His apology was extended; he explained the situation with legal counsel and the decision not to hold the workshop. Christenbury added that in order to call a meeting, it is legal to poll the council, to see if there would be a quorum. Within our charter, the manager also has this authority to poll the council. It was based on a legal decision not to hold this meeting.

Seeing no one else, the Mayor closed citizens forum.

**Gary Gilmore** of Middle Road is here as the Chair of Citizens Solid Waste Advisory Commission. He stated this has been a concern of the council over the last 10 years. This has always been a summertime problem with landlords; sidewalks should be for walking on not storing rubbish on. This past year the city finally prosecuted a landlord on Atkinson Street. In that prosecution the city attorney became aware, this ordinance needed work. Again this is only a very few landlords. He strongly urged the council to pass this ordinance.

**David Kline**, Attorney and landlord in the City of Dover, stated just as the previous speaker he feels trash should also be off the sidewalk. The ordinance says all landlords will provide these dumpster structures. His apartment dwellers are requested to keep their trash inside their apartments. He does

not feel this is fair and should not be enforced for all landlords. He suggests that they give them a choice, either store trash inside or build structures to store trash. Some of these structures are ugly. He suggests going back to solid waste; he would like to work with the city on this issue.

**Joyce Forsyth** also a landlord along with her husband for the last 45 years. This is a major problem for landlords. They have this written in their leases and the tenant must sign a form that they will keep their trash inside their apartment or she has the right to pick up their trash and fine them a fine of \$15. for her picking it up. They did try to have tenants put their trash outside but she ended up doing the recycling for her tenants. They now have no problem of trash in her apartments. She would like herself, Attorney Kline and Joe Nelson to review the wording of the ordinance and maybe propose a solution to the city. She has several questions regarding the current proposal.

The Mayor explained that Dunnington was away and they could address this with him when he comes back.

**Tom Hindle**, of 35 Atkinson Street in Dover represents the historical aspect of the city, and the ability to draw tourists to the city. When he purchased his land and home on his street, things were different. Now there is a real problem with the trash and recycling program here in Dover. The animals that vandalize the trash barrels and bags and spread it all over the place. He goes around and takes photos and documents different buildings in the city. He has tried to resolve this trash issue. He handed out a flyer to all the council. He feels everyone should sit down and work on this, he does not feel trash inside the apartment is good for the tenant's health. Why can't the landlord buy a trash barrel for each tenant so that the tenant can play by the rules? NO WHERE on the trash handout does it state anything about Chapter 97. He continued about all the trash being on the sidewalks. Hindle also continued about mattresses and barbecue grills stored out on the sidewalk for a full week. He showed several pictures of trash on the sidewalks on a daily basis. He feels the city is as much at fault as the landlords. Landlords need to be responsible for their tenants, he is not singling out any one person, and he just wants this issue addressed.

Seeing no one the Mayor closed the public hearing.

## **8. REPORTS OF SPECIAL AND STANDING COMMITTEES**

- A. Transportation Advisory Commission – Councilor Jason Hindle

Hindle explained this month the commission is celebrating one year of establishment by the council. This month they will meet with the Bellamy Road group for feedback. They are an advisory commission; the council sets policy and they cannot do anything except recommend policy. The issue this month is Cataract and Rutland Street. The residents affected by this have been notified by letter.

- B. Joint Building Committee (Horne Street School, DHS Mezzanine) – Councilor Jason Hindle

Hindle stated they had met this past Saturday, and Horne Street is progressing nicely and hopefully it will be complete by the start of school. If you drive by the DHS of late, you will notice the football field is being worked on. He stated, the city gave them gravel and saved them \$8,000 for improvements. He mentioned the 4 contractors that were chosen. On Saturday, August 24 they will meet with these contractors.

C. COAST Bus – Councilor Ray Tweedie

Tweedie has no report.

D. Planning Board – Councilor Parks Christenbury

Christenbury stated the Planning Board continues to meet to discuss the changes to the zoning law and changes to certain parcels. There is a meeting at 6:30 next Tuesday night; zoning is a very controversial issue. The one area that he wants to touch upon is that if the city rezones a certain parcel, it does buy insurance for the city. We should put aside money to buy open space to keep that land for the citizens of Dover. We are also trying to provide jobs and they are also trying to make some open space. He gave credit to Councilor Whitmore for her input. He continued stating they welcome input.

Taylor asked if the Planning Board was going to present a plan for the whole city or parcel by parcel. Christenbury stated staff is addressing the whole package. Taylor wants to know if we will vote on this as a whole or piece by piece. Christenbury states they will have the whole package. Hindle thanked the Planning Board and city staff for putting together these zoning changes.

E. School Board Liaison – Kevin Quigley

F. Solid Waste Advisory Commission – Councilor Thomas Dunnington

G. Seniors Advisory Committee – Councilor Roland Hofemann

Hofemann stated he had had a slow month. He listed his events. Hofemann also attended the 37<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Medicare and spoke at it. He attended the Wentworth-Douglass open house and also an event at the Youth Haven Center. He announced that on the 21<sup>st</sup> of August there would be a senior oral health program at the library open to seniors.

Christenbury asked if “the don’t shut out the shuts-ins program” was up and rolling. Hoffman stated, yes it is up and rolling.

H. Arena Commission – Brenda Whitmore

Whitmore stated there were not enough members to meet last month. She is working with Gary Bannon to review a ten-year contract for the maintenance of the cooling system.

Taylor moved to accept, seconded by Tweedie. All were in favor.

## 9. CITY MANAGER’S REPORT

The City Manager curtailed his report in the interest of time and deferred to the open land committee people. Brian Stern gave the history of the committee, stating about 3 years ago the open lands committee formed. He is now the chairperson. This is a very active commission, originally there was a lot of time spent organizing. He handed out an explanation of the committee’s events including a map that shows their strategy that they will be looking to follow. This will protect waterways, etc.

Mr. Stern explained the assorted parcels. He continued that he also has openings for new members. This is completely voluntary for citizens to join. As a result of the mapping, they have contacts with the landowners. He feels this is a good news report. There is \$630,000 in their budget. This is really not a large amount of money. He thanked all the city staff that has attended their meetings. He is excited about having all this open space in Dover; he turned it over to Anna Boudreau, member of the Open Lands Commission.

Ms. Boudreau stated, one of task groups was education outreach. As a result of the workshop, the planning office had an unprecedented amount of people call about their land to place it in conservation. She continued about the county land that she has worked for and the county commissioners. She mentioned she was excited about the transfer of development rights that Christenbury had mentioned. She told everyone how to contact them.

Brian Stern added the county land that has been preserved is 220 out of the 230 acres. Taylor moved to accept, seconded by Whitmore. All in favor.

## **10. UNFINISHED BUSINESS**

### **A. ORDINANCES IN 2<sup>ND</sup> READING**

1. Ordinance #26-07/19/2002, Chapter 79, City Property, Section 79-12, Use of City Property (City Hall Building). Sponsored by Councilor Brenda Whitmore.

Whitmore moved to adopt, seconded by Tweedie. The Ward 2 polling place will be in city hall from now on. This ordinance will clarify the use of city hall for partisan purposes. She explained the ordinance and how it will clear direction on who can and who cannot rent city hall. Tweedie agrees entirely saying city hall is not for sale. Taylor asked about the political button, also not politicking on our city hall front steps, she feels they should not be able to come to make their announcements. Hoffman agrees with Taylor's comments. He read the 15-year old resolution. Hindle commented he wanted to offer an amendment to this. Christenbury feels this is a unique one, he gave Kingston as an example of a town that allows political signs to be put up anywhere. One individual that called him did not want Benson signs on city property, but wanted to rent city hall. We are placing a tremendous burden on staff at city hall. He feels the ordinance reads "the building" and not "the steps out front of city hall". People have not been lining up to rent this place in these 15 years. It became an issue this year because the candidates are from this area. One of these tenants is the motion that is offered. He feels inside city hall should be a sacred place. He would support Hindle's amendment; also it should say the steps are okay. Hofemann is still reading the old resolution about the auditorium. He continued this should not be the council chambers. Nossiff will agree with Brian Stern, the attorney; this is an aggravation of free speech. There are so many ways to create exceptions. He went on about aspiring candidates. The space could be barred from being rented 30 days or 10 days before an election. He has many questions for this ordinance. He gave definitions of partisan politics, etc.

Whitmore appreciates the Mayor's passion, but this is not an ordinance of passion, it is one of clarification. She will give the City Manager the credit he deserves to let him make the decisions to rent city hall or not. The Mayor says city hall is in fact for sale. In his opinion, this is ill conceived.

Tweedie defended his position. Taylor does not know what happened, why was one candidate not allowed and the other was allowed? Hindle offered his amendment now to Section 3. that will have the ordinance not take effect until after Election Day-November 5, 2002, Christenbury seconds the motion. Whitmore, Christenbury, Hindle and Tweedie in favor. Amendment carries.

Tweedie proposes an amendment o Section 2.1. to read "the inside of City Hall", Hindle seconds the motion. Hindle, Whitmore, Christenbury and Tweedie in favor of amendment. Amendment carries on a vote of 4-3. Main motion with amendments passed on a roll call vote of 4-3. Hindle, Whitmore, Christenbury, and Tweedie in favor.

2. Ordinance #27-07/10/2002, Chapter 133, Peddlers and Vendors, Section 133-7, Exemptions (religious organizations). Sponsored by Mayor Alex Nossiff.

Taylor moved to adopt, seconded by Tweedie. Motion passed on a roll call vote of 7-0.

3. Ordinance #28-07/10/2002, Chapter 97, Dumping and Rubbish, Section 97-7.1, (Containers). Sponsored by Councilor Tom Dunnington.

Taylor moved to adopt, seconded by Tweedie. Taylor moved to table, Christenbury agrees but wants to comment, as there seems a valid point that several landlords are willing to help with a solution. He feels the impetus is there to work on this for a solution. Hindle agrees to table but feels the council needs to send this back to the solid waste advisory commission to look at the entire chapter. Hindle seconds. All in favor of tabling.

Taylor moved seconded by Hindle to adopt. Motion passed on a roll call vote of 7-0.

The question was asked, would we have time for public input on this issue? Steele answered, yes. Tweedie asked the City Manager for background and where is the location. Steele says the location is from Penny Lane all the way down to Central Avenue. Tweedie says what exactly is the construction? Steele says parking retaining walls that will affect several residents' properties. Whitmore wants Steele to let people at home know when the final design is due. Steele stated in January 2003 this will be put out to bid.

### **12. MAYOR'S REPORT**

The Mayor commended Quigley on attempting to get together a neighborhood meeting on Tuesday, August 20 at the Woodman Park School on the McIntosh College issue and all residents are invited. He sent 600 notices out to the neighborhood. The meeting is for voicing your opinions to McIntosh College's president. The Mayor continued, the city is working on an email policy, as there are problems with emails. And third, we received approval for the dredging of the river. It will start in the fall of 2003. The views of the citizens are very diverse and this will take steps to come to an agreement to make proper decisions.

Taylor moved accept, seconded by Quigley. All in favor.

### **13. COUNCIL MATTERS OF INTEREST**

Hindle wants to set a date for next meeting but he needs direction for a date. The Mayor says the next meeting is September 11, 2002. Tweedie asked if the City Manager could explain why the Spruce Lane meeting was cancelled. The Mayor says that could not have occurred because litigation is involved. The City Manager agrees with the Mayor's explanation. The ZBA is the format to discuss this issue now. Hindle needs a workshop scheduled for his TAC parking issue. Christenbury wants to know about the consulting firm and the Planning Department and where they are going on this issue of parking. Hindle clarified this all started with the parking lots and when he became chair of TAC, there were two factions and they are divided on this issue. Hindle wanted the subcommittee to speak at the workshop. The Mayor asked what about the September 18 for a workshop? Hindle continued we would need to reschedule the TAC meeting. Hindle wants a representative from the police department and Steve Stancel there as well.

The Woodman Park School meeting will be in the gym on August 28th. Christenbury says you have graciously allowed the council to congratulate Doug Steele as second in command in the Community Service Department and the public service he gives. That is a new level of professionalism since Doug has been appointed to this position. Christenbury is formally recognizing him.

Hofemann has one more point regarding the 611 tax notices recently mailed out. He hopes the resolution for the September 11<sup>th</sup> meeting will resolve the income level. Hindle pointed out to the

council with the recommendation to send the medal to the Woodman Institute, he wants to abstain on this motion. With regards to the September 11<sup>th</sup> date, Quigley wants to change the meeting date. Christenbury disagrees saying the business of the city must move on in spite of September 11.
