**2. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE**

Mayor Boc led the Pledge of Allegiance.

**3. A. ROLL CALL**

Members Present: Mayor Boc, Councilor Dunnington, Councilor Hindle, Councilor Mayberry, Councilor Nossiff, Councilor Reese, Councilor Schmidt, and Councilor Andrews Parker.

**B. ELECTION OF MAYOR PRO-TEM**

Hindle nominated At-Large Councilor Reese, seconded by Dunnington. All in favor.

**4. MAYOR'S REPORT**

On 9/25 he attended a licensing board appeal on a decision to revoke a taxi driver license and the appeal continues. On 9/27 he spoke at an event put on by the Dover Middle School band and chorus at the Dover High School. The students did a good job showing leadership in city; this event was put on by Sue Hodgson. He gave special thanks to Colonel Gary Cyr from the NHANG who participated in the event. On 9/29 he threw the opening pitch at a whiffle ball event raising money for the Strafford County Red Cross. On 9/29 he also attended a dinner for Dover Sports Hall of Fame. On 10/2, he attended a ribbon cutting at Crescent City Bistro, a great restaurant. On 10/6 he opened the 17<sup>th</sup> Annual Apple Harvest Day. On 10/6 he attend the ribbon cutting ceremony at the new Public Works facility on Mast Road. He stated, this is a splendid facility. On 10/9 he attended a DEDC meeting and will read a Proclamation on the Dover Aquarium. He appointed Bob Berry to DEDC. He read the proclamation on the aquarium. The Mayor continued by reading a proclamation for Breast Cancer Awareness Month during the month of October. The Mayor mentioned pink ribbons would be available in the City Clerk's office. Reese moved to accept, seconded by Mayberry. All in favor.

**Richard Hughes - 51 New Rochester Road.** Mr. Hughes stated he has a copy of the resolution and there is no accompanying information. The last time this meeting was brought up under a suspension of rules, he saw an article in the newspaper that Mayberry wants to add two firefighters. Hughes feels there is a miscalculation in the total amount of the resolution. No explanation has been offered. He urges the public to keep this in mind on November 6, 2001.

**Ron Huml - Ward 4.** Mr. Huml stated everyone has been listening to the news about the downturn of the economy. Now that we are at war against terrorism, he feels this money is being spent unwisely and wants to wait for a new council. He just heard that the cost of living has gone up 2.5% to 2.7%. He recommends a reduction in the budget rather than an increase.

Seeing no one else, the Mayor closed the Public Hearing.

## 6. CITIZEN'S FORUM

The Mayor opened Citizens Forum. He asked Scott Myers to explain the DEDC resolution on the agenda tonight. Scott Myers went on to explain the Enterprise Park project explaining the revenues and number of people employed there. He continued, stating that this past year was a turning point for the park. There is a bit more than 50 developable acres left in Enterprise Park, he explained the map that was included in their packets. At this point in time, the DEDC has letters of intent for these three parcels. The gross sales are expected to be \$300,000 in gross revenues. The initial tax revenue will be \$25,000 to start.

Hindle has a comment. This should be done during the Public Hearing and not Citizen's Forum. He has a problem with having this taken up at this time.

**Robert Plourde - 64 Bellamy Road.** Mr. Plourde presented a petition signed by residents of Bellamy Road with concerns of speeding, and increased traffic. Speeding in this area is a safety hazard; he also has a safety problem with students of Dover High School. He stated some of the students are out in the road running for athletics and traffic is heavy at certain times. He deferred to his neighbors to speak.

**Jeremiah Cady - 68 Bellamy Road.** Mr. Cady moved here two years ago. He stated he has seen only 3 police officers for traffic surveillance since he has been there. The speed limit is 30 m.p.h. and people go 40 – 50 m.p.h. Kids go up and down the street from school; he wants the speed limit dropped. His son is not allowed to play in the front yard because there is too much traffic. There is a sign that says trucks are not allowed and there are trucks.

**David Smith - 38 Bellamy Road.** Mr. Smith is concerned for the families, students and visitors to our street and the safety of children and his own grandchildren in this area. When he first

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moved in, there was traffic surveillance and he would like to see that again. Also, the signs indicating speed and surveillance are down. He also would like to see the speed limit lowered to 25 m.p.h. He also has seen large trucks including 18-wheelers go down the street. He is concerned and does not want to see somebody die before this is fixed.

**Jack Meyer - 46 Bellamy Road.** Mr. Meyer has lived here well over 10 years. This has become a cut through for trucks and they are definitely not allowed. He watched a state trooper give out 3 or 4 tickets in a half of an hour, he would like it maintained as a residential area. He wants the council to consider this.

**Maria Sherman - 75 Bellamy Road.** Ms. Sherman does not want to be redundant. She addressed her concerns last year and also has called several of the large trucking companies and complained personally to the trucking companies with no assistance from any of the council. Something needs to happen here, whatever we (the residents) can do we are willing to assist by taking down numbers, etc. She asked, what can they do to help? The speed limit sign was rusty and has been taken down. The surveillance sign is also down.

**Scott Booker - 70 Bellamy Road.** Mr. Booker has been there 13 months. Traffic is out of control in this area. They need a police presence on the Route 108 end Monday through Friday. He stated the police could use his property to park.

Hindle stated this will be brought up at the Transportation Advisory Committee and he will ask the City Clerk to mail out letters to the residents of Bellamy Road.

**Paul Allen - 48 Bellamy Road.** Mr. Allen stated the potholes were unbelievable. He continued by stating this is a very dangerous place to live. He has been there since 1961, he does not know the long-range plan is for these hills.

**Ron Huml** again on the ordinance on loud radios. It is worse now than it has ever been. He is sitting in his living room and the noise is unbelievable due to loud radios.

**Richard Hughes - 51 New Rochester Rd.** Mr. Hughes mentioned the news media items on financial issues. All the New England states have taken steps to limit expenses. During budget deliberations, Mr. Beecher projected other revenues would be flat for FY 2002. The City receives funds from the State and there is no guarantee the State of New Hampshire will not reduce them next year to makeup revenue shortfalls. Many local businesses are reducing their number of employees and the council should cut expenses by 2%. He does not feel this council should spend any more to bind the next council up again. He also mentioned the article in tonight's paper on tax assessment.

**Ron Weeden - 41 Bellamy Road.** Mr. Weeden stated it has been an on-going activity getting safety implications of the fields corrected. Numerous city vehicles are parking under the parking signs. Police officers are driving in the area and totally ignoring the signs.

**Nick Skaltsis - 6 Erik Drive.** Mr. Skaltsis gives congratulations to the Mayor Pro Tem. He mentioned three resolutions on the agenda tonight. One with the school board and truancy, one is a trust for alternative school, and one is for severance pay. He stated this is a liability on the school side, he explained the schools perspective on this resolution in the area of the alternative school trust. The current problem is with any special needs situation. They indicate what the student may need; it may be \$15,000. Anything that we charge greater than what we have

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"guesstimated" we are not allowed to spend. We can't determine this in January during our budget. It is impossible to spend the money because the services vary from student to student because of their special needs. These are unknown factors.

Seeing no one else, the Mayor closed Citizen's Forum.

Reese moved to accept, seconded by Hindle. Schmidt has submitted his corrections. All in favor.

### 8. REPORTS OF STANDING AND SPECIAL COMMITTEES

- A. Planning Board – Councilor Jerry Reese

Reese stated the Planning Board met on October 9, 2001. They considered and accepted (C/A) an application for a Conditional Use Permit for Donald Smart & Saundra Ackler located at 38 Fisher Street. C/A an application for a minor Lot Line Adjustment of land for Kenneth & Barbara Godin located on Parsons Lane. C/A an application for a site review of land for Terra Nova Property I, LLC located off Venture Drive. C/A an application for Conditional Use Permit for Jason and Barbara Theodore located at 16 Leighton Road. Under old business, they discussed and voted to approve 28 lots for Stabile Homes located on Tuttle Lane.

- B. Public Works Building Committee – Councilor Peter Schmidt

Schmidt stated there was a delightful meal put on by Horne Construction at the new Public Works building. The ribbon cutting was on Saturday, October 6. We are slightly under budget, but there are a few items that they will likely still need to do.

Hindle wondered if this event was paid for by Horne or with city dollars; he would like the proof. The City Manager will provide receipts.

Nossiff is stunned to hear that this facility is coming in on budget of \$4.9 million. Nossiff feels this is a very impressive building. He asked, does it include water and sewer improvements? The City Manager stated, the sewer is not included. The sewer serves the Public Works facility. It will also serve any new tenants that will tie in at a later time. They will be charged. Nossiff would like a figure on sewer. The City Manager will provide these numbers.

Andrews Parker wanted to know the purpose of Councilor Hindle's question regarding who paid for the event at the opening of the facility.

Reese asked if there are any functions left down on River Street. The City Manager stated, the only one is recycling and that will be addressed next year in the CIP. Nossiff asked about impact fees. Is that what the Planning Board sets? The City Manager stated there is one item on the agenda tonight relating to impact fees. Are people going to pay for the cost of tying into the Mast Road project? The City Manager stated, yes. He explained there are two separate fees, one based on frontage and the other is the tie-in fee.

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Andrews Parker wondered when the old Public Works building would be taken out. Schmidt says they are not addressing that area. Because of cost and design, this issue is unresolved. The City Manager says they will be tearing down the old Public Works facility during the winter.

### C. COAST Bus – Councilor Peter Schmidt

Schmidt reported the Executive Committee has met again and are considering whether to take the in-house operations, he feels it will be their ultimate decision. They also received notifications that the buses that they are purchasing are going up in price. Buses will begin production in December and arrive sometime in February. Mayberry asked about propane and electric buses. Schmidt says the trolleys are not designed for this kind of operation. He stated none of these have the capability that is needed to be run on either of these kinds of power.

### D. Solid Waste Advisory Commission – Councilor Thomas Dunnington

Dunnington reported the September meeting was held October 4 and revolved around the composting at the Hebbard farm. It was sort of a little jury. There had not been a lot of dialogue between the two groups. The neighbors indicated that the smell has abated greatly. Things have improved dramatically in the area. He hopes the matter won't end up in the courts. One of the concerns expressed by the neighborhood was the size of the facility. They do not know the answer to this. They will be looking to the City Manager. He wants the neighborhood to continue to be part of the process. And their input was greatly appreciated.

October 27 is hazardous waste day at the old site. He wants people to take advantage of this opportunity to dispose of hazardous waste. Almost anything that you have in your household can be disposed of there on this day. Also, leaf pick up will begin November 5<sup>th</sup>. The last thing they talked about was the Mayor's hours and thanked him for volunteering the one time. They are tracking the number of people coming to the extended hours. He will be back with numbers. Reese asked if there is a list of items that can be taken at the recycling center. Mayberry asked Dunnington if people use paper bags for leaves are stickers required? The leaf bags are biodegradable and if you buy the paper leaf bags, they will pick them up also. Schmidt asked for the dates again. November 5 - 9 and November 12 – 16 are the dates for leaf pick up. He also wondered about people sneaking hazardous waste into a trash bag. Dunnington says, the trash guy takes it out and puts it back on the sidewalk. Dunnington says this is a no-brainer. This is once in the spring and once in the fall. He hopes of having this as a storage-type thing for people to take things whenever they need to. Schmidt is concerned about the contamination of the landfill.

Andrews Parker asked if the Solid Waste Committee is concerned about where they sell the bags and can they go to Wal-Mart to see if they will sell them. Hindle is concerned about the rental units and their concern with the bag and tag program. Dunnington says this has been a concern of the committee, but they have not come up with anything as yet. This is a difficult problem and they are willing to listen to suggestions. Hindle has a suggestion on rental property. Have the apartment owner provide a packet to the person that rents the apartment out with information about recycling, bag and tag, dog leash law, etc.

### E. Elementary Facilities Committee – Councilor Jason Hindle

Elementary Facilities Committee has not met recently.

### F. Alternative School Joint Building Committee – Councilor Jason Hindle

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For the Alternative School he called on Nick Skaltsis. Nick spoke in general there is a fund in excess of \$10,000 that they may wish to spend for equipment in this building. There was a balance of \$6,000 that was spent on ledge, for blasting. He thanked the council for their support and they hope to open in January. There are benefits to taxpayers, we spend in excess of \$40,000 per student to send these kids out of district and it will benefit them to stay in the city. The cost is about one-third. Mayberry asked if we approved funds for elementary expansion. Is it EFC? Hindle stated the facilities committee was just an advisory committee for what needed to be done. With the new council coming on board that could change. Mayberry asked, do road sign requests go to Hindle or to the City Manager. The City Manager says either.

### G. Transportation Advisory Commission – Councilor Jason Hindle

TAC will be meeting tomorrow and will be discussing a new date and time for their November meeting and will let the Bellamy residents know when the meeting will be. The committee needs to review crosswalks, review additions or deletions. Schmidt asked when truck traffic will be on the agenda? They will also discuss train transportation.

### H. Ball Fields Committee – Mayor Wil Boc

The committee has not met since the last meeting. Progress is being made. That will be the next challenge. This is only half of our need.

### I. North End Fire Station Committee – Councilor Betsey Andrews Parker

Andrews Parker reported the committee will be meeting with contractors over the upcoming week and will have recommendations for the next council meeting.

Reese moved to accept reports, seconded by Mayberry. All in favor.

## 9. CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

The City Manager addressed a couple of items on Bellamy Road. We do not collect any revenues from tickets written by our police department. The money goes to the state court system. Secondly, the City Manager responded to Mr. Hughes who reports that we do all things he points out, but just do not toot our horn when we do it. He gave the revenues and expenditures so far. Through the month of September we have \$1.8 million in revenue with expenditures of \$4.1 million. On the economic development side, in September we issued 80 building permits worth \$4 million in construction value and \$17,720 in fees for the city. He stated, he wants the council to accept that the grinding has been done on Locust so with acceptance of this report this will indicate their approval. He will have information on the train for the inaugural run. Steve Stancel has been working with the court to set up the ribbon cutting. He congratulated Nick on reporting on the assessed value adjustments. He has Jeff Harrington and Wil Cocoran here tonight. The Mayor asked about software that was purchased about 6 years ago to keep us up to date. Do we have this software and are we up to date? The City Manager stated problems have occurred in the last couple of years with the market. Wil Cocoran commented the last two years have been extraordinary in growth and value. The Mayor asked about the sales and what the city enters into the program. Hindle asked if the city treasurer and city assessor would discuss for people at home who might not have read the article in the paper. Jeff explained the tax rate that is driven by the budget was adopted in June, then they wait through the summer to realize values for the year. The net effect of the value was a 42%

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increase, with a \$6.12 decreased per \$1000 down to \$22.36 in value per \$1000. As far as the assessment side, the booklet is available in several offices in City Hall.

Jeff asked Wil Corcoran to continue. Wil stated, we are in the middle of a change in the legislature and Dover is ahead of its time in this concept. Last year, we did an update of certain sections of property; they went after those that were wildly out of line, such as condos, apartments, and businesses. Hindle asked what is the percentage of increase? Wil says 43 – 44%. It is different for different sections.

Mayberry asked a question for a constituent about page 2 of the report. Was that to level them out? Wil says that is correct. It is market driven. In 2000 we had everything equal, commercial was increasing, as well as, condominiums and apartments. Nossiff makes it clear that the tax rate will make it come down. He feels it is in everyone's best interest to have the tax bills mailed out soon. Also he is certain there is an orderly system to deal with any grievances related to this matter. Hindle asked when will the bills be sent out? Wil Corcoran stated the rate must be set by the DRA. Then, notices will be sent from his office notifying them what their assessment will be. Andrews Parker reiterates getting notification to the taxpayer early so that they can save the money. The City Manager clarified that this bill reflects what the council passed in their budget deliberations in May or June, so the person would just add the \$2.99 per \$1000 to their tax bill.

Mayberry mentions the charter amendments are available in the City Clerk's Office.

Reese moved to accept, seconded by Hindle. All in favor.

### **10. UNFINISHED BUSINESS:**

#### **A. ORDINANCES IN 2<sup>ND</sup> READING**

1. Ordinance #26-09/12/2001, Chapter 131, Offenses, Section 131-16, School Truancy. Sponsored by Mayor Wil Boc, by Request.

Reese moved to adopt, seconded by Mayberry. Chief Fenniman explained the ordinance. The Mayor asked if we will have a truant officer? The chief explained that this is a part time job but they have a grant that will be paying for an officer. Andrews Parker asked how is this getting to the issue of kids missing school. She is not in favor as she feels there are additional reasons for kids missing school. The Chief clarified that they have a systematic approach to this problem. Dunnington says his experience with the court system is the extreme case. Schmidt asked the Chief if he and the school department have a pretty good handle on who is not in school and why. Nossiff says the issue is going to be when the parent does not follow through. Motion passed on roll call vote of 8-0.

#### **C. RESOLUTIONS**

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Reese moved to adopt, seconded by Mayberry. Motion passed on a roll call vote of 7-1. Dunnington opposed.

2. Resolution RE: Amendment to Dover Utility Commission Rules and Regulations and Water and Sewer Capital Reserve Funds. Sponsored by Mayor Wil Boc by Request.

Reese moved to adopt, seconded by Hindle. Reese asked about hooking up MDU (multiple dwelling unit) and is it based on the number of units. The City Manager says this is based on the number of units. Mayberry asked about fees from the pump station something that Nossiff addressed previously. Nossiff says the pump station is a nightmare as the city takes these over from the developer and the sewer line will not run up hill. These are very costly and have a limited life. We are looking for a one-time fee to charge the developer. The City Manager feels this is a good idea as the city usually ends up taking these over. Mayberry asked with regards to his ward on the waterfront and the peoples' aging water systems. The City Manager feels this should be treated on an issue by issue basis. He will refer it to the utilities commission. Schmidt asked if the City Manager could give us a rough idea of how many pump stations we currently have. The City Manager stated he would find out and let them know. Andrews Parker asked, would this be able to fix Old Rochester Road and could these fees be used for this and are they retroactive. The City Manager stated, yes to all.

Motion passed on roll call vote of 8-0.

3. Resolution RE: Fiscal Year 2002 Budget Amendment #1. Sponsored by Councilor Matt Mayberry.

Mayberry moved to refer to the November meeting, seconded by Andrews Parker. All in favor.

Reese moved to accept 1. and 2. and grant 3., seconded by Mayberry. All in favor.

Reese moved to adopt, seconded by Mayberry. Reese does not feel this was severance but accumulated sick leave and wanted that clarified of any misunderstanding. Andrews Parker motions to amend the fund for designated purpose only, seconded by Dunnington. This is to clear the intent. All in favor of amendment. Main motion with amendment passed on a roll call vote of 8-0.

2. Resolution RE: Establishment of Alternative Education Fund. Sponsored by Mayor Wil Boc, by Request.

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Reese moved to adopt, seconded by Hindle. After much discussion, motion to adopt passed on a vote of 7-1. Andrews Parker opposed.

3. Resolution RE: Appropriation of Funds for Maintenance of City Recreational Playing Fields. Sponsored by Mayor Wil Boc, by Request.

Reese moved to adopt, seconded by Mayberry. Motion passed on a roll call vote of 8-0.

4. Resolution RE: Award of Bid #B02010 for Fire Safety Education Trailer. Sponsored by Mayor Wil Boc, by Request.

Reese moved to adopt, seconded by Mayberry. Reese asked what will we do with the old trailer. Chief Bibber says we will auction it off. Motion passed on roll call vote of 8-0.

5. Resolution RE: Award of Purchase Order for Hydrogeological Subsurface Investigation. Sponsored by Mayor Wil Boc, by Request.

Reese moved to adopt, seconded by Hindle. The City Manager assures us this is the last payment for the court building. Dunnington wants to know why the state is not paying for this. The City Manager stated one of the requirements the state required is to provide a site free of charge to them. This was part of the testing needed to give them a free and clean site. Motion passed on roll call vote of 8-0.

6. Resolution RE: Award of Bid #B02022 for Recreational Field Turfgrass – Sod. Sponsored by Mayor Wil Boc, by Request.

Reese moved to adopt, seconded by Hindle. Motion passed on a roll call vote of 8-0.

7. Resolution RE: Appropriation of Funds and Award of Purchase Order for Broadway/Rollins Road/Oak Street Intersection. Sponsored by Mayor Wil Boc, by Request.

Reese moved to adopt, seconded by Mayberry. Motion passed on a roll call vote of 8-0.

8. Resolution RE: Dover Industrial Development Authority Authorization for a Roadway and Utilities Project at Enterprise Park. Sponsored by Mayor Wil Boc by Request.

Reese moved to adopt, seconded by Mayberry. Dunnington stated 3 companies had requested lots. How imminent is this? The City Manager stated lot 1 is ready to go and lots 2 and 3 will be ready in the next 6 months. Dunnington stated, he does not want to be building roads and sewer systems in this economy and not use them for the next 10 years. The City Manager feels this is a good investment, he explained how and who would be responsible for building the road. In this case, it is easier for DEDC to build the road. The sale of the 4<sup>th</sup> lot will cover the cost of this. Nossiff has concern about the three attorneys on the council voting on these. There may be a conflict of interest. Nossiff would also like to know what the mission is of the future of DEDA. Third, he wants to know about the waterfront. Reese says Nossiff is correct. The Mayor corrected that both of these resolutions need to be referred to a public hearing on October 25<sup>th</sup>. Scott Myers clarified where the lots are on the map including lot 6.

Reese amends the original motion to refer to a Public Hearing on 10/25, seconded by Mayberry. All in favor.

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9. Resolution RE: Bond Authorization for Construction of Roadway and Utilities in Enterprise Park. Sponsored by Mayor Wil Boc, by Request.

Reese moved to refer to a Public Hearing on 10/25, seconded by Mayberry. All in favor.

**12. COUNCIL MATTERS OF INTEREST**

Schmidt mentions the explanation of the redistricting charter change is available in the City Clerk's office. He would like to make it clear, he feels this is in the best interest of Dover and we must comply with federal and state statute.

Reese congratulates the Public Works, Community Service Department for completing Sixth Street. It is a great street now. He thanked them for appointing him Mayor Pro Tem.

Dunnington encouraged people to get out and vote in this election. This is an excellent way to show the community and State we will be okay.
