2. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayberry led the Pledge of Allegiance.

3. ROLL CALL

Councilors Mayberry, Nossiff, Reese, Schmidt, Andrews Parker, Mayor Pro-Tem Berry, Mayor Boc, Councilors Dunnington and Hindle. All present.

The Mayor read and handed out the Certificates of Recognition for the Dover recycling committee, he recognized Jessie McKone, Recycling Committee member. She explained that the contest challenged students to come up with simple, but an effective environmental message. Ms. McKone also recognized the teachers who were very involved with the projects, as well as, the Solid Waste Advisory Commission. Conan Magnussan attends Dover High and received the top recognition for his design on the Recycle Bumper Sticker. Gersten Blatt was presented a Certificate of Recognition for her Earth Day Bumper Sticker. Ms. McKone and Gersten Blatt presented a copy of each bumper sticker to all the City Councilors.

The Mayor opened the public hearing asking if anyone wanted to speak.

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Bob Lewis of 16 Whittier Street (former Councilor) stated he has not attended any School budget meetings, but he does read the newspaper and he can't understand and won't accept that we need 33.5 new staff people. He has read it is critical to have these new people because of the new social studies curriculum and the need to maintain a smaller class size. There is no accurate study that class size has any relationship to learning. Mr. Lewis feels larger classes can be beneficial. His daughter had 750 in one of her college classes. Further, if we are implementing a new curriculum how can it benefit further? He reminded the Council we still have teachers' salaries to negotiate and 5% is already built into the structure without passing anything. He feels this budget is much too large to pass.

Valerie McKenney of 12 Nile Street has two children in the Dover school system. She is here in support of the School Budget. She was employed as a teacher in Dover from 1990 - 1997. She used to worry about the \$0 increase in the School budget for 5 years and the effect it would have on the kids. She remembers not having the tools to do her job; she feels we are paying the price for all the years of \$0 increase. She is currently teaching in Portsmouth as a Special Ed teacher and she does not work nearly as hard. If we want our district to move forward in a positive way, they should pass this budget as presented. She does not feel the classes are exceptional, just adequate and she doesn't see a lot of fat in the budget.

Erv Sparkman of 232 Tolend Road stated he has followed the budget process for the last two years and is discouraged and he feels there has been no challenge to reduce this budget. He believes when the City Councilors agreed to serve, they should be responsible. He stated, the issue is not how much the taxpayers can stand; it is about living up to obligations and doing what is right. He would like to see some workshops held before the adoption. And contrary to what the others feel, he stated there is "wiggle room" in this budget.

Stephanie DeMatteo of 6 Tennyson Avenue stated she also has two children in the Dover School system. She is in support of the budget. She disagrees about class size. Her child has 27 in his class and the proposed number of 30 is just unacceptable in this City.

Patrick Holcomb of 6 Union Street stated education is important, but taxes should not be raised. The tax base should be raised. Why do we spend after the fact? The increase in taxes is unacceptable.

Norm Champagne of 13 Church Street was home watching and realized he needed to speak. He commented on the five year \$0 increase in the school budget. He stated, you should consider what the taxpayers can afford. He disagrees and feels there are many things that the City has to spend money on including a new ice arena and Camp Sun 'n Fun. We need to spend money on a north end fire station. Mr. Champagne stated he is forced to go up on rent for his tenants because water and sewer bills are up and he has to pay them.

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Gail Sciabarrasi of 7 Roberta Drive would like the City Council to support the school budget as it is. She is a paraprofessional, special Ed teacher and there are not enough of them to go around. Her classes in York, Me, where she works, only have about 15 or 17 children in each class. Ms. Sciabarrasi stated she has a 7th grader and a 9th grader of her own here. She sympathizes with people that they can't pay, but she is willing to pay. This is important for the children. In fact, she moved from Strafford to Dover just for the schools here.

Dave Landry of 5 Trakey Street gave a brief general comment, he is disappointed that they are not going line by line, the department heads know their job and you won't win an argument with them. The focus should be on revenues and not on expenses. Focusing on expenses is a losing battle. It winds up being a futile exercise, but by looking at the proposed increases and trying to whittle that down, you are conceding all the money from the last year's budget to what would amount to be a 0% increase. You could give the school an 8% increase and not change the tax rate. We are not saying no to anything. He's not suggesting a 0% increase; he would appreciate a little more thought and thoroughness.

Maureen Claussen of 4 Birchwood Place has two students in the Dover school system and she is in support of the budget as it is presented to you.

Armand LaSelva, Superintendent of Schools stated he emphasizes this budget really reflects what we need here in Dover. Granted we have a new curriculum with added courses, but they are required for graduation. With the revision it requires additional staff to teach it. There is nothing automatic about the teacher's salary increases. He has new initiatives they are trying and they have student growth. It's unreasonable for 150 students to be turning in things to one teacher. He asked the City Council to give serious thought to the school requests.

Kevin Quigley, At Large School Board member stated he has three students in the Dover School system and he is concerned about the budget and the curriculum. We are working with books that are 15 to 20 years old. He asked the City Council to pass the budget as is. He feels they do need to hire some of the proposed new teachers.

Denise Jorgenson is here as a parent, citizen and taxpayer. She stated she has five children and 4 of them are in the Dover School system. She doesn't want her taxes to go up anymore than anyone, but she is concerned for the children. The children will suffer if the budget is cut. She strongly urges the council to pass the budget as is.

Nick Skaltsis of 6 Erik Drive stated he wants to answer some questions. He expected some of the increases in the School budget. He tried to clarify the increase from 1994 – 1998 stating the school tax rate only fluctuated about .50 cents. Last year, it dropped \$2.00. With this proposal the tax rate will go back up. He stated 2/3 of the Cities and Towns in the State would face what Dover will face. No candidates are talking about doing away with the Claremont money.

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The other concern that was brought up by Councilor Nossiff is what could reoccur with the 36 new positions, really only 10 are new teachers. Also, we now have ten acres to maintain and they need groundskeepers, he would like the Council to take a hard look and accept the budget as it is presented.

Seeing no other speakers, the Mayor closed the Public Hearing.

The Mayor thanked everyone for coming out tonight.

The Mayor opened the public hearing asking if anyone wished to speak, seeing no one he closed the public hearing.

5. CITIZEN'S FORUM

The Mayor opened citizen's forum, asking if anyone wished to speak.

Dave Landry of 5 Trakey Street stated with regard to the new ice arena, he is confused and he will urge the council to use caution. Last December a number of Councilors had voted against the project including himself, as he does not feel this is an enterprise fund. He was told user fees would pay the entire cost of the bond. He feels we should be able

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to tell the taxpayers it will not cost them a dime and it will be paid for by user fees or it is not functioning that way, he urged the City Council to find answers to these questions.

Norm Champagne of 13 Church Street stated, in case people have forgotten, the arena was a gift to the citizens and most of the time it has run in the red. Now we are saying it is an enterprise fund, he is more concerned about getting a new fire station on the north end of town, as well as, the equipment they need, namely the thermal imaging equipment. He asked, what are the priorities here?

Berry asked for a point of order, that we may not be discussing the arena tonight. Nossiff agrees with Berry. He feels the citizens should be available to speak later, though.

Sam Allen stated he had received a call from a Foster's reporter and as Chair of the Arena Commission, this was the first he had heard of this resolution. As far as he is concerned, they have had a public hearing and this is a project that has been already approved. What will we try to do next? He spoke about the rumors that are out there about the arena, but he stated they are trying to stay within the budget. Rink number one is at 100% capacity and rink number 2 is 70-75% spoken for and it is not even built yet. He feels this is a sports complex, not just an arena project. As of right now, we have \$330,000 in private money committed to the project and there are additional groups that will be committing to this. There are no guarantees and there has been some discussion that some arenas in the area are not doing well but those are arenas without a customer base; they are not like Dover. We need to keep in mind this is a municipal complex.

Currently, it is the fortunate kid in the city who is able to play hockey. Fees for hockey range around \$600 - \$900 per year. That's just the registration fees (excluding travel, equipment, etc.).

No one that attended the home show last weekend was opposed. They had set up a table with proposed plans for the new complex and several people stopped and were pleased with the plans. He is disappointed that this project is being brought back with no real facts.

Marty Sullivan, President of Dover Youth Hockey Association feels there won't be a problem with funds; he thanked Nossiff and realizes he is concerned about his own money. They are trying to solicit personal and corporate funds. He is part of the silent majority. He stated last year they had had to turn citizens away from the ice due to its being filled to capacity. They currently hold a bingo each week and people can pay for hockey for their kid that way if they do not have the money. If the arena is put on hold, they will have to drop something, probably the girls' team and put a few other things on hold.

Patrick Holcomb again states he is a sports fan; if this is not going to be a self-sufficient arena, shouldn't we be putting the money into the roads or Police Department or Fire Department instead?

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Erv Sparkman of 232 Tolend Road started by apologizing but he is confused about the issue here, based on what he has heard. He wonders why there is a concept of this being an enterprise fund; we need to make it clear what the intent is. This project was sold entirely on the basis that it is entirely run as an enterprise fund. He understands the arena fund did not have the money, so they had to borrow by bonding. If there is some reason why the enterprise fund won't pay it back, then this should be reopened. If not it shouldn't. The citizens need to know up front.

Lisa Oliver is on the Arena Committee, she lives at 81 Bellamy Woods and has one child who plays hockey. She is unprepared for this evening, as she was not even told about this resolution. This is a total surprise to her. She's shocked after working so hard on this project.

Chuck Todd of 30 Applevale Drive has two children and has been a participant of hockey for many years. Part of the reason his kids belong to the teams is it takes up their idle time. By increasing the ice; more kids will be able to play. He hopes this item remains passed.

Lisa Harris is the treasurer of Dover Youth Hockey Association. She stated they have made a commitment over a 20-year period to donate \$5,000 per year; they are trying to do something for the community.

Steve Barraclough is on Dover Youth Hockey and is speaking for his son. They are committed to the new teams. This facility would add a lot to the City.

Seeing no one else who wished to speak, the Mayor closed citizen's forum.

Berry moved, seconded by Mayberry to accept the minutes. Schmidt mentioned he had presented the clerk his corrections and would like the minutes passed as amended. Motion passed on a 9-0 vote.

7. MAYOR'S REPORT

The Mayor stated he had a Mayoral Award to present this evening. He recognized Debbie Tasker of Dover Adult Learning Center, who for more than 3 decades has dedicated herself to changing people's lives for the better. The Mayor read the proclamation and presented it along with the key to the City to Debbie. She thanked the Mayor and stated that it is she that has been privileged to work with brave people who want to learn and it is she who should thank every one for the opportunity to be a part of their lives.

The Mayor then read a Public Works week proclamation and presented it to Pete Lavoie, Director of Community Services. The Mayor also read a proclamation for Water Works week and also presented it to Pete Lavoie.

Next he stated he had attended the Breakfast of Champions at Wentworth-Douglass Hospital. Also on April 27th, he attended the Dover Fire Fighters Association dinner and on April 30th he had thrown the first pitch for North Side Little Leagues opening. On May 2nd he cut two ribbons at All Trades and FHC Industrial Supply. On May 2nd he spoke to the student Government Day participants about being Mayor of the City. On May 5th he attended the Garrison Players function. On May 6th he had opened South Side Little League and Dover Babe Ruth League. Lastly, on a somber note, he wanted to let the record show we had taken a moment to remember Joe Sawtelle on his passing. He then thanked all 250+ people that came out to help clean up the City last Saturday. He then stated we need to set our agenda for the upcoming public hearing. It was decided they would hold the City Budget public hearing on May 31st at 6 p.m. with the budget adoption on June 7th at 7 p.m.

Andrews Parker asked if we could move the Mayor's report to the beginning of the meeting. Berry would like a resolution to move the Mayor's report and the City Manager's report to before the public hearings. Berry moved, seconded by Mayberry to accept. Motion passed by all.

8. REPORTS OF STANDING AND SPECIAL COMMITTEES

A. Planning Board – Councilor Jerry Reese

Reese stated the Planning Board met on May 9th, and considered and accepted a site plan for land for McIntosh Properties LLC on Silver Street. Second, they discussed and voted on a site plan for a minor subdivision for Motiva Enterprises, LLC on Old Dover-Rochester Road/Long Hill Road/Route 108.

B. Public Works Building Committee – Councilor Peter Schmidt

Schmidt stated the Building Committee is proceeding with site plans. The architect's plans have progressed. They are looking at studying water and a baseline study is needed, so they are held up on site work, but they are moving right along. Also, they will be having a neighborhood meeting.

C. Arena Building Committee – Councilor Matt Mayberry

Mayberry referred to the recent events (referring to the new resolution) and he will speak later on this issue.

D. Coast Bus – Councilor Peter Schmidt

Schmidt stated they had met on Tuesday morning but he was unable to attend. The paperwork is proceeding on the purchase of the C&J facility and should be finalized

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soon. He stated a recent fatal accident on Old Rochester Road involving a COAST bus being struck had been reported, but the passengers on the bus were unharmed.

E. Solid Waste Advisory Commission – Councilor Thomas Dunnington

Dunnington stated they had met on April 20th and talked about the bumper sticker contest. They also talked about the Burlington conference in June the next meeting is May 18th and all are welcome to attend.

Mayberry wants the consent of the City Council about a citywide pick up of general stuff. He would like a consensus to see if we can agree to have this done. Berry clarified we need a formal resolution for a clean up day. Andrews Parker asked for clarification, is this about a leaf day, or what?

Pete Lavoie stated you could call his office and make an appointment to have item such as a fridge or stove picked up by our contractor. Schmidt feels before they act on this, we should get a handle on the request. Mayberry will bring a resolution forth at the June meeting and the Mayor will co-sponsor it.

Berry moved, seconded by Dunnington to accept. All were in favor.

9. CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

The City Manager stated with regard to the increase in revenue, non-property tax revenue through April 30, 2000 of \$6.3 million or 99% of what we budgeted for. The expenditures on the city side are \$12.5 million to date. On Economic Development, the city issued 69 building permits with a value of \$3.4 million and collected fees in the amount of \$18,570.

Everybody got their water bill the other day. He apologized, stating this was a six-month bill due to the computer conversion and next time it will be a 3-month bill, as it should be. Berry complimented community services and the city workers that helped during the clean up last Saturday. Berry moved, seconded by Dunnington to accept the report. All in favor.

Berry moved seconded by Hindle and Mayberry, to suspend the rules to introduce item 11.A.7., Parade Permit for Dover Community Girl Scouts. Passed on a roll call vote of 9-0. Berry moved, seconded by Hindle to grant all permits. Passed on a vote of 9-0.

Berry moved, seconded by Mayberry, to refer to a public hearing on 5/31/2000 at 6 p.m. Passed on a vote of 9-0.

2. Resolution RE: Appointments Committee Recommendations to Various City Boards and Commissions. Sponsored by Councilor Jerry Reese, Chair, Appointments Committee, Councilor Bob Berry, and Councilor Matt Mayberry.

Reese moved, seconded by Mayberry, to adopt. Passed on a vote of 9-0.

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Berry moved, seconded by Mayberry, to adopt. Passed on a roll call vote of 9-0.

Berry moved, seconded by Mayberry, to adopt.

Andrews Parker asked about the bid and why the big difference in the bids. Lavoie stated that National Gun had built the tank in 1968, so they knew exactly what is up there and they are the original people. The Mayor asked about the color and will it be painted gray. Lavoie stated, yes. Passed on a roll call vote of 9-0.

5. Resolution RE: Award of Bid #B00041 for Construction Equipment Rental Rates. Sponsored by Mayor Wil Boc, by Request.

Berry moved, seconded by Mayberry, to adopt. The Mayor abstained, as some of these people are clients of his law firm. Passed on a roll call vote of 8-0.

Nossiff moved to suspend the rules regarding Rescind Arena Improvements Appropriation, Nossiff commented before suspension that he is concerned the arena will not run on fees. Motion to suspend the rules passed on a roll call vote of 8-1, Berry opposed. Nossiff moved, seconded by Hindle, to adopt and put on the table for discussion. Nossiff explained this resolution and how he feels the arena is not run as an enterprise fund and that it will not sustain itself on fees. He stated we owe it to the citizens of Dover to slow the process down and revisit this item. This is a matter of trust, given the fact this is not going to be run on user fees. Hindle stated he supports Nossiff's resolution. He went on to say, we have school facilities that are crumbling. He lives on a fixed income and may be forced to move. He also has received many phone calls from constituents asking about the project. Mayberry commented the overriding theme here is trust and integrity. He has not received any phone calls against this effort. He went on, the last City Council voted to spend \$6,000 on a feasibility study and this resolution annoys him as the committee is working on this project very hard to keep the project within the proposed budget of \$3.6 million. The Mayor spoke, saying we are all friends and let us debate the issues and not each other. Berry stated we have rules that we should go by and they need a week for resolutions to be presented to the Council. We need to look at the big picture here for the arena. People will eat in our restaurants, and visit our businesses. Berry also had gone to the Home Show and looked at all the people talking to Gary Bannon's staff about the plans for the project. He does not want to touch our fund balance and will be voting against the resolution. Dunnington stated he voted to suspend the rules because of his respect for Nossiff but he cannot support the resolution for several reasons, we should not question what a prior Council had done. He feels it is a wonderful project and he feels it is on track. Schmidt stated he too felt Nossiff had the right to present his resolution. He is not a hockey player and has never even been to a hockey game, but still he feels it is very important to this

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community that this project go forward. He feels the City will support it and he will not support the resolution. Andrews Parker stated she voted to suspend the rules as a fellow councilor. She stated she had called Johnson, her predecessor, for information on this item. She will not be voting in favor of the resolution because if we do not take this project on, then another town will. This will impact a lot of businesses in town and lastly she does not want the girls' hockey team to be left out. The Mayor mentioned procedures and how items really need to be put on the agenda ahead of time. He explained the arena project and that the Planning Board had come in and voted for it with several public meetings, he feels we should follow the process and he won't support this resolution. He feels this is a favorable and upbeat thing to do in the City. Schmidt stated, as an alternative representative on the Arena Building Committee, the one thing that struck him is how inadequate the current facility is, he feels that women will suffer the most if we do not do this project. Reese moved the question, seconded by Dunnington. All in favor of moving the question. Motion to adopt failed on a roll call vote of 3-6, Nossiff, Reese and Hindle in favor.

12. COUNCIL MATTERS OF INTEREST

Hindle apologized to the Council for his remarks, stating this subject has really angered him, as well as, some of his constituents that he represents. Berry feels the arena is an emotional issue, he then commented on former Councilor Landry's request for the Council to go line by line in the budget process, he feels we may still do this but we just received the detailed school budget this evening and this is not easy one to go over. He stated he will be sending 140 kids off to Washington D.C. in the very early a.m. Andrews Parker wished Berry good luck; she thanked the Elks for hosting Student Government day and she thanked the Rotary for sponsoring her as a guest. Dunnington thanked all those involved in the City clean up, including his fellow Rotarians. He stated out-of-towners couldn't believe it, but he feels we are right on track. Nossiff stated he has played sports all his life and he is very concerned, as he still has not heard the reason we are not slowing down on the arena project. He would like to earn all the money ahead of time. He stated all the knowledgeable people that he has spoken with that are in favor of the project, feel they will not break even. There are many, many other concerns in the City right now and he feels this project should not be rushed.
